### 2024 Trainings for Tribes on Data Science

The Tribal Exchange Network Group (TXG) is pleased to continue its partnership with <u>The Carpentries</u> organization to offer free online trainings for Tribal professionals interested in learning new skills and reinforcing best practices for effective data management, analysis, and visualization. Workshops are taught by Carpentries-certified instructors with experience teaching learners from a wide variety of backgrounds, and no prior knowledge is required for learners to be successful. Over the course of three days, instructors will present the workshop topics through the use of guided lessons, open dialog, and individual practice. Lessons use the same sample datasets and easy-to-follow instructions for ensuring everyone can access the same information before, during, and after the workshop.

## 2024 EPA Clean Water Act Tribal Forum, Washington, D.C. May 14-16, 2024

The U.S. EPA Office of Water is hosting the second Clean Water Act (CWA) Tribal Forum at the National Museum of the American Indian in Washington, D.C.

The Forum is for Tribes with experience administering water quality programs who want to discuss challenges, benefits, and available tools. Topics include: Tribal water quality standards (WQS); IK and Tribal water quality programs; Waters of the United States rule and implementation; CWA Section 401 certification and implementation; CWA Section 404(g) rule development and implementation.

### Indigenous Data Sovereignty and Governance Summit: Building Action and Power Tucson, AZ, April 11-12th, 2024

The U.S. Indigenous Data Sovereignty (IDSov) Network will hold a two-day summit on the homelands of the Pascua Yaqui Tribe. IDSov and IDGov advocates will use the summit toward the following three goals, 1) Establishing a national standard in the US. for Indigenous data governance, 2) Creating an Indigenous data standard via nation-to-nation partnerships between Indigenous Peoples and the federal government, and 3) Enhancing Indigenous Peoples' laws, policies, and systems for Indigenous data sovereignty led by the priorities of sovereign Indigenous Peoples for our shared data futures.

# EXCHANGE NETWORK UPDATES

### **Learn about the EN Grant Program**

FY 2023 will be the 21st year EPA will award competitive funding to eligible partners for projects through the Exchange Network Grant Program. Between FY 2002 and FY 2022, EPA provided approximately \$260 million for state, tribal, and territorial awards and associated program support through the grant program. As of February 1, 2023, all 50 states and the District of Columbia, 86 tribes, and 5 territories have received EN grants. These grants support better environmental decisions by promoting the use of more timely and consistent data which is shareable by partners across the EN as well as by environmental professionals and the public.

## TRIBAL DATA IN THE NEWS

### <u>Penobscot Nation's Watershed Restoration</u> <u>Data Advocacy Efforts Inspire</u>

Angie Reed, celebrating 20 years as a Water Resources Planner for the Penobscot Nation, sheds light on the practical application of using R for data analysis for watershed protection and restoration. Working alongside numerous Tribes, state and federal agencies, and academic staff, Angie also contributes to national tribal workgroups. Her engagement with Native Nations has a strong emphasis on the Wabanaki homelands, but her influence and work extend throughout Turtle Island.



## Native Nations Seek to Expand Broadband Access

Tribal communities in Arizona and beyond are working to establish their own broadband networks to support bringing internet access to their underserved communities. Highlighted during the COVID-19 pandemic, many Tribal communities lack of adequate access to internet networks that are reliable and robust. ## Tribal Broadband Connectivity Program Announces Second Funding Opportunity

The National Telecommunications & Information Association's Tribal Broadband Connectivity Program provides funding to support tribal governments to develop broadband deployment on tribal lands to improve telehealth, distance learning, broadband affordability, and digital inclusion.

A second round of funding from the Tribal Broadband Connectivity Program will make approximately \$980 million available on Native American, Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian lands for deployment of Internet infrastructure, affordability programs, telehealth and distance learning initiatives.

## Indoor Air Pollution at Schools (EPA-R-OAR-APS-24-02)

The total estimated funding for this competitive opportunity is \$32,000,000. EPA anticipates awarding four to six grants of \$5,000,000 to \$8,000,000 to support five years of Indoor Air Quality activities. Eligible applicants may submit only one grant application to fund activities in two or more of the four project areas: 1) IAQ and Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Reduction Capacity Building, 2) Tribal IAQ and GHG Reduction Capacity Building, 3) IAQ and GHG Reduction Training and Education Campaign, 4) IAQ and GHG Reduction Research and Demonstration Projects in K-12 schools in low-income, disadvantaged, and/or Tribal communities.

The Climate Pollution Reduction Grants (CPRG) program provides funding to develop and implement ambitious plans for reducing greenhouse gas emissions and other harmful air pollution.

Eligible Entities: Generally, entities eligible to apply for an implementation grant under this announcement are federally recognized tribes, tribal consortia, and territories.
